Now, the weeds and wheat grow together, their roots intertwining. The farmer tells his slaves to do nothing until harvest time. If they were to intervene before harvest, they risked uprooting the wheat.

Upon first glance, this parable is simple – but look closer, and it is challenging. What farmer would let weeds grow among their wheat? But this farmer is wise and patient.

This parable illustrates how vital patience and humility are, especially in times of division and unrest. The parable warns us: don't condemn and demonize others! Don't assume the messianic role! God, the farmer, has defeated the enemy before and will defeat him again, if only we listen to his sage counsel. Grow together, and wait. God will sort it out.

At Grace Chapel, we strive to follow God's command to grow together! Conservatives and liberals. Immigrants and citizens. People from every race, class, culture, and nation. People who worship in quiet and contemplation, and people who worship with dancing and shouts of joy. Let us all grow together, as God's children.

Thank you for reading and celebrating our 10th Anniversary with us. As we enter our second decade of ministry in Brockton, I pray you will grow with Grace Chapel in whatever way God is calling you to. We give thanks to God for His providence and mercy. Hallelujah! Amen.


Agnes, independent and opinionated, is the stronghold that glues her family together. While she will set someone straight if she thinks they are going in the wrong direction, she loves unconditionally.

Oluwafemi Christopher Alayo, Clerk





At Grace Chapel Brockton, Sunday worship looks like our congregation: vibrant and diverse.

On Sundays, we infuse the Episcopal Holy Eucharist Rite II liturgy with inspired gospel songs, dancing, clapping and tambourines.

We invite our community to lift up the Prayers of the People in their native languages. While our primary language is English, at various times, you can hear Yoruba, Haitian Creole, English, Portuguese, or Swahili in the service. After Sunday school, our children join us for communion and blessings. We always end Sundays sharing coffee, snacks, conversation, and encouragement with one another.

In addition to the liturgy, we incorporate other interactive programs into our Sunday worship. On the first Sunday of the month, Rev. Moses preaches a sermon drawn from that week's Lectionary readings. We then identify a theme from the IESSP Curriculum that is aligned with the lectionary reading to explore throughout the month.

On the second Sunday, we hold an interactive Bible study. Everyone has the oppotunity to ask questions and offer their own insight and wisdom on the gospel lectionary for the week.

On the third Sunday, we hold a hands-on empowerment workshop. Rev. Moses invites the congregation to talk about how the week's readings apply to our own lives. Where do we see ourselves in the scriptures? Everyone takes home a practical teaching to apply to their everyday life.

On the fourth Sunday, we share our testimonies. We call this "the Gospel According to the People" or "the Fifth Gospel." In these "lived gospels," members of our congregation share their life testimonies. People share how God is present in both their challenges and victories. Some people have yet to see victory over the obstacles in their lives, and need encouragement. We make space to pray for them then and there.

A mixture of liturgy and interactive programs enrich and grow our spiritual life together. We want everyone who attends or visits GCB to know the Gospel lives within them.







The Gateway City of Brockton

According to the Massachusetts Institute for a New Commonwealth (MassInc), "Gateway cities are midsize urban centers that anchor regional economies around the state." Brockton is one of these "gateway cities," home to approximately 90,000 people, including a large and diverse immigrant population. Once, plentiful manufacturing jobs bolstered Brockton's economy. As those jobs have vanished, Brockton has struggled to flourish economically.

Geographic mobility and financial hardships are challenges in our city and congregation. Some of GCB's members have to travel to our Brockton location, and are often unable to do so. Since the Covid-19 pandemic, we have seen an uptick in online church attendance. Even after we return to in-person services, we hope to continue engaging our online community.

Despite the challenges it faces, Brockton is far from a lost cause. On the contrary, Brockton and other gateway cities "retain many assets with unrealized potential" (MassInc). Brockton has the "existing infrastructure" and "disproportionately young and underutilized workers" that MassInc cites as assets to building a thriving city.

Brockton is home to so many talented and hardworking people. As many of our members face financial hardships, we strive to make GCB a center of encouragement and support.



OUR PROGRAMS



Shaping the Future

As our former President Barack Obama said, "We do not fear the future; we shape it." The Brigade Youth Program in Brockton is raising up young people who are shaping the future.

When Rev. Moses arrived in Brockton in 2010, he discovered families "struggling with their young people." Searching for direction and support, these teenagers needed community.





"I thought, what can I do for them?" Rev. Moses recalls. He bought a piano, ordered pizza, and started a youth ministry. "We kept playing piano and ordering pizza. Our numbers grew, and I thought again, what can we do for them?"

Moses remembered how The Boys' Brigade in Nigeria offered him purpose and belonging. Wanting to give that gift to Brockton youth, he set out to create a program to celebrate each child's individuality, while building leadership skills and spiritual community.



Originally founded as a Christian youth program in Scotland in 1883, the Brigade program's core values are "Discipleship and Discipline." Sir William Alexander Smith, a Sunday school teacher and volunteer soldier, organized a bored, aimless group of boys in his class into a youth brigade centered on discipline and spiritual formation. The Brigade integrated marching band, sports, and hymns to instill discipline in the boys who lacked direction

The Brigade Youth Program in Brockton began in June 2011, welcoming boys and girls. Our youth now had the space to explore the scriptures, build new skills, go on field trips, and play instruments in our marching band.

On November 20, 2016, the Brigade Youth Program in Brockton officially joined a global network of Brigade programs with thousands of members worldwide. The Rt. Rev. Alan Gates officially inaugurated the first Boys' and Girls' Brigade in Brockton during a celebration of the Brigade's impact on Brockton youth. Friends and dignitaries including the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts' Rt. Rev. Bud Cederholm and the Anglican Church of Nigeria's The Ven. Dr. and Mrs. Julius Adekoya joined us for the occasion. The Brigade marching band and the Higashi School jazz band entertained our guests.

When the Covid-19 pandemic began in 2020, the Brigade program adapted. Instead of in our regular meeting space, we met on Zoom. Although nothing compares to in-person interaction, the kids still wanted to connect with each other. As we write this, 25-30 kids join us for the Brigade online every Saturday from 12 PM - 1 PM.

To this day, the Brigade gives Brockton youth a place to make friends, explore their interests, and grow in their faith. Our kids often say they see their fellow Brigade members as their own siblings.





Sunday Sessions

Our Sunday school partnership with the First Evangelical Lutheran Church does not provide a program for teenagers, so we decided to use the energy around the Brigade to fill that need. We created a Sunday morning Brigade session for any teenager seeking spiritual community, regardless of whether they are members of GCB.

The Sunday Brigade session focuses on general faith discussion and formation. Brigade teenagers also participate in our Sunday services in many capacities.







After-School Program

As our ministry grew, it became clear that some kids needed support not just on Saturdays or Sundays, but with their schoolwork during the week.

We set our sights on a new goal: expanding the Brigade program to include an after-school session during the week. Three days a week, we focused on academic tutoring, individualized mentoring, and music programs. Unfortunately, we had to suspend our after school program due to lack of space. Our hope is to provide a full week of after-school sessions for our community's youth in the near future.



IESSP

IDENTITY - EDUCATION - SOCIAL - SPIRITUALITY - PLAN

Working with educators, parents, spiritual leaders, and volunteer mentors, Rev. Moses has developed an innovative program called the Identity Educational Spiritual and Social Plan (IESSP). He drew inspiration from the Individualized Education Plan for children with special needs in the education sector, and from the poem "They Are Singing Your Song" by Alan Cohen. Rev. Moses envisioned a world in which children have the guidance they need in every area of their lives.

Our Brigade kids use the IESSP to discover who they are. The IESSP calls on caring adults to nurture each child's unique identity through their educational, spiritual, and social development.

We match kids with mentors, connect them to age-appropriate resources, and develop curricula for social and emotional learning. With this support, kids grow into confident, empathetic, spiritually-grounded adults.

GOING PLACES

Transportation has been a challenge for the Brigade since its beginning. The majority of our Brigade members are children of single moms, who aren't usually available to drop off and pick up their children from activities. To meet our kids' needs, we offered transportation to and from the Brigade program, using parishioners' personal cars and sometimes a hired bus.

However, this changed in 2018 when GCB was blessed with generous individual donations and a South Shore deanery matching grant. We used these funds to purchase a van especially for the Brigade.

On Easter Sunday 2018, we blessed our new 16-seater van, which we named "The Helper." The Helper makes it easy for any child, no matter their income or family structure, to have fun and find spiritual belonging in the Brigade.







COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS



Thanks to Christ Congregational Church holding the World Voices program in 2017, nine Brigade girls were able to commit to a weeklong winter break music program. The program ended in a wonderful concert, and our Brigade girls were featured on the front page of the Enterprise, Brockton's newspaper.

In the Brigade, we make the most of every opportunity to celebrate. The Brigade has participated in the Brockton Holiday Parade, held a Christmas Carol & Concert, and organized a Community Parade with activities for all of Brockton.



BARBARA C. Houris Camp

GCB consistently brings in the highest number of youth to the Barbara C. Harris (BCH) Camp in New Hampshire. Every year since 2017, we have recruited and sponsored 30 campers for annual summer camps. Our high school kids have also participated in weekend retreats. Our wonderful GCB members drove kids to and from camp.

At BCH, our Brigade kids have the opportunity to hike, sleep in tents under the stars, do arts and crafts, and more. Most importantly, they have the opportunity to pray and worship with their Brigade siblings and make new friends from different parishes.

BCH camper fees come up to hundreds of dollars, which the majority of our kids can't afford. Thanks to a generous campership grant from BCH and a scholarship from the Rt. Rev. Alan Gates, all of our campers' fees were paid in full, including delicious meals and snacks.







Without our community's support and the Diocese's generosity, our children wouldn't have been able to have such unforgettable camp experiences.

ALAND AND STRUMEN

VISIT FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM

For several years, Brigade leaders in the UK had followed the Brigade Youth Program in Brockton on Facebook. In summer 2019, two UK Brigade representatives came to visit us. Over their two-week stay, they met our children and Brigade leaders and gave gifts. Our leaders exchanged ideas and discussed the challenges and joys of running our youth programs. We look forward to partnering with the UK leaders in the future to create an exchange program.









The Brigade in NIGERIA

Rev. Moses has maintained a relationship with the Brigade in Nigeria over the years. To establish a Captain of the Brigade, that person must train with a certified officer in an established Brigade Company. Cheryl-Ann Hall-Hurley has been training with Nigerian Brigade Officer Titilayo Adenuga to become the Brigade Captain in Brockton. In the future, we hope to visit the Brigade in Nigeria and establish an exchange program.

They award several scholarships:


- The Bishop Gates Reconciling Spirit Award, awarded to a youth who brings people together across differences

- Ephraim Sowale Musical Instrument Award, awarded to a youth with enthusiasm and commitment in learning an instrument






Advisory Board



THE ABIGAILS WOMEN'S PROGRAM

Strong like Abigails

Our women's program finds its inspiration in two remarkable namesakes: the biblical Abigail and Abigail Adefuye Sowale.

Women in our community face unique challenges. Many are single mothers of children in the Brigade Youth Program. These mothers often work multiple jobs to make ends meet for their families.

It quickly became clear to Rev. Moses that women in our community needed greater support and care. Rev. Moses' own mother, Abigail Adefuye Sowale, raised him as a single parent after they lost his father when he was young.

The biblical Abigail, whose story is found in 1 Samuel 25, is a woman of many faces. Her wisdom, intercession, and boldness set her apart. Abigail used her vulnerability within the patriarchal society she lived in to confront an impending threat.

Inspired by his mother's and the biblical Abigail's vulnerability and courage, Rev. Moses envisioned the Abigails Program as a sacred space for women of all backgrounds and experiences.

A place where women could build community capacity and encourage one another. A place where women could share their wisdom. A place where women could lay down their burdens and heal.















He wrote a grant proposal to Episcopal City Mission (ECM), an organization which funds the cprogram to this day, to start a women's group. The grant covers programming, childcare, life coaching, a get-away retreat, and counseling for women. 65 women gathered for a founding dinner on January 30, 2016, laying the foundation for the Abigails Program.

We sort members into six age groups: Explorers, Curious, Adventurous, Courageous, Grounded, and Golden. The Abigails meet monthly to encourage each other and grow together in their relationships and faith.

Under Comfort Sowale and her team's leadership, the Abigails Program has become a source of refuge, strength, and belonging for women in our community.

We believe that women can not only weather their challenges, but thrive. Every day, our Abigails embody the strength and vulnerability of the program's namesakes





Annual RETREAT

It's often hard for women, especially single mothers, to find time to care for themselves. Our intention is for our Annual Abigails Retreat to give the women in our community much-needed time off. In 2019, five Abigails were able to go on a retreat to enjoy each other's company, build each other up, rest, and let themselves be taken care of. They returned empowered, reenergized, and relaxed. We look forward to establishing a regular retreat for the Abigails once we determine it's safe for our community.

Annual REDEDICATION

The Annual Rededication is a tradition borrowed from the Mothers Union in the United Kingdom and Nigeria. The Mothers Union is traditionally for married mothers, however, the Abigails welcome all women, regardless of whether they are married or have children. Every January, the Abigails come together to rededicate their lives to Christ and reflect on their personal and communal achievements in the previous year. They also share what they hope to achieve in the coming year.



OFFICIAL INAUGURATION



In November 2019, we invited Bishop Gayle Harris to officially inaugurate the Abigails Program in a service of song and celebration. Bishop Harris preached, gave gifts, and commissioned **Comfort Sowale** as **President** and the following women as *leaders of the Abigails:*



OUR RELATIONSHIPS



The Church of Nigeria

Grace Chapel Brockton's relationship with the Anglican Church of Nigeria began long before GCB was ever established. The Church of Nigeria touched key aspects of Rev. Moses' life: his early home and family life, his education, and his vocation.

When Rev. Moses began ministering in the American Episcopal Church, he noticed the differences between the two churches. The American Episcopal Church and the Anglican Church of Nigeria are divided on theological and doctrinal issues.

GCB acknowledges the tension between our church leaders, for whom we have the utmost respect. We at GCB also wrestle with the complexity of our times, theologies, and doctrine. We strive to be a place of ongoing dialogue, mutual respect and reconciliation. Our leaders in the Episcopal and Anglican churches across the globe enrich our church with their wisdom and faith.







At GCB, we take solace in the words of our Lord Jesus Christ found in Matthew 13:24-30, referenced in Rev. Moses' earlier letter. We believe we must trust God, the wise farmer, and grow together until the harvest.

Currently, GCB's relationship with the Bishop in Nigeria relies on Rev. Moses and our faithful members from Ibadan North Anglican Diocese: the Alabis, the Yerokuns, and the Adepojus. We want to ensure that our parish always has a strong connection to the Church of Nigeria.

Our congregation has composed a letter to the Most Rev. Segun Okubadejo, Bishop of Ibadan North Diocese and Archbishop of Ibadan Province in Nigeria. In our letter, we express our sincere desire to establish regular communication, discuss the divisions in the Anglican Communion, and build on our existing relationship.

We accept members no matter their sexual orientation or gender, relating to one another in our love of Jesus Christ. Despite our differences, we seek to keep communication open with the Church of Nigeria. We don't see our differences as a problem to fix, but rather as a blessing. We hope to foster dialogue and promote Christ's love and mercy in Nigeria, and across the globe.











THE VOICE INC

The Voice Inc.

The Voice Inc.'s vision long preceded its relationship with GCB. At age 18, Rev. Moses had a vision. God mandated him to be a Voice, as depicted in Isaiah 40: a Voice calling to raise up every valley; lower every mountain and hill; level the rough ground, make plain the rugged places; and prepare the way of the Lord.

Further inspired by a conversation with friends in June 1994, Rev. Moses founded The Voice Inc., a faith-based nonprofit organization registered in Nigeria and the U.S. Concerned with the socioeconomic inequality he witnessed in Nigeria and around the world, Moses sought to bridge the gap between people with different identities. To this day, the vision God gave him is being realized in GCB's partnership with The Voice Inc.

The Voice Inc., also sometimes known as The Finger-print, is a group of lay and ordained men and women of all ages, political views, races, and Christian denominations. They have the mandate of using Christ's principles to help people claim their identity. Together, they advocate for social justice, acknowledge individuals' uniqueness, create spaces of belonging, provide for their community's basic human needs, and set people up for success. They want all who are alienated or silenced because of their unique differences to have a Voice.

As Rev. Moses puts it, The Voice Inc. is his spirit and hope for this world in an organizational form. When we recognize and honor each individual's beautiful authenticity, our world becomes a better place.









It takes a village to sustain our impactful ministries, and our village would be incomplete without Episcopal City Mission

(ECM). GCB's relationship with ECM began in 2015 when Rev. Moses wrote grant applications for the Brigade Youth Program and the Abigails Program. 22 ECM is a nonprofit organization that builds relationships and collective power across Massachusetts for racial and economic justice as the expression of God's transforming love. Investing in Episcopal communities and faith-rooted leaders is a crucial part of ECM's mission.

While the Diocese of Massachusetts provides the majority of our program funding, ECM provides grant funding for both the Brigade and the Abigails. Since 2015, GCB has received the Parish Partnership Grant totaling \$20,000 each year to distribute between both programs.

As a grantee parish, GCB attends ECM's Annual Meeting and Annual Celebration to continue strengthening our relationship and sharing GCB's work. GCB is the only parish that brings their youth to the Annual Meeting, inviting our kids into the processes and relationships that sustain our church. Grow With

WHERE WE COME FROM





In our parish, we come from many different places and perspectives – but we all grew together to establish a strong foundation for Grace Chapel Brockton. We owe our parish's vitality and success to the Grace of God and a vast network of faithful people who believed in us.

Our History

Grace Chapel Brockton's story is about God bringing people together in unexpected ways and in an unexpected place: Brockton, Massachusetts.

In 2010, the Rev. Moses Sowale, an Anglican priest from Nigeria, moved with his young family to Brockton, MA. He was pursuing his graduate degree at Boston College. A few blocks from Rev. Moses' home stood St. Paul's Episcopal Church: a parish with a record of community engagement that was struggling to reinvent itself.

Rev. Moses' first connection to the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts was through the Rev. Dr. David A. Killian of All Saints Parish Brookline. All Saints graciously covered part of Rev. Moses' school expenses before he got his immigration papers, enabling him to continue his studies. Rev. Killian introduced Rev. Moses to the Rt. Rev. Bud Cederholm, a longtime proponent of Brockton and community outreach. Bishop Cederholm saw Rev. Moses' passion for youth, women, and immigrant communities. He introduced Rev. Moses to St. Paul's leadership, who hired him as Minister for Outreach in May 2010.

St. Paul's, however, was coming to an end. Upgrading and repairing the church would have required approximately one million dollars. Although the Diocese determined St. Paul's needed to close, they did not want to lose this new spark of vitality ignited with Rev. Moses's leadership.

A powerful network of faithful individuals continued to emerge. Eleanor Wentworth, a longtime St. Paul's member, and Gretchen Umholtz, a new addition to St. Paul's leadership team, shared Rev. Moses' enthusiasm for community outreach. Two Nigerian Anglican couples living in Boston, the Adepojus and the Alabis, already knew Rev. Moses. Inspired by his vision, they were willing to drive any distance to be a part of his new work in Brockton.

That new work began with door-to-door outreach, Bible study, and a new early Sunday morning worship service. Grace Chapel Brockton launched on Sunday, August 8, 2010. Rev. Killian continued supporting Rev. Moses and sent representatives from All Saints Parish Brookline to the first Sunday service at GCB.

Relationships with other parishes have always been integral to our church's thriving. Thanks to Bishop Cederholm's vision and wisdom, GCB partnered with the First Evangelical Lutheran Church (FELC) at 900 Main Street in Brockton, our physical church home to this day. We made history on Sunday, February 20, 2011 when Bishop Cederholm presided over a joint service for FELC and GCB in our shared building. Our partnership with FELC has helped our church grow into the diverse, distinctive parish it is today.

In addition to a physical home, GCB also needed an administrative home within the Diocese. Initially, St. John's Holbrook provided this administrative support, and welcomed us as part of their own parish's budget and outreach. Several St. John's members loved joining us for worship and supporting our ministries. In 2013, we celebrated an important milestone: we graduated from the nurturing care of St. John's and grew into a more independent direct ministry of the Diocese. Since that time, all our operating expenses except for salaries and benefits are covered by our own members' giving and fundraising efforts. We are so grateful to everyone at St. John's Holbrook for their love and support.

GCB has been blessed to have relationships with bishops and faith leaders inside and outside the Episcopal Church. We celebrated our first anniversary on Saturday August 6, 2011, followed by a historic thanksgiving service that Sunday. Bishop Cederholm presided over the Holy Communion with Archbishop Segun Okubadejo (then Bishop) of the Church of Nigeria Ibadan North Diocese as preacher.

In 2014, the Rt. Rev. Samuel Sowale of the Church of Nigeria Ilesa Diocese preached and worshipped with us. In 2015, the Rt. Rev. Alan Gates of the Diocese of Massachusetts preached at the morning service for the FELC. In 2018, the Rt. Rev. Gayle Harris of the Diocese of Massachusetts brought words of hope and healing to GCB.





Most recently, Bishop James Hazelwood of the New England Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church preached at a joint Good Friday service for GCB and FELC.


We have had the honor of hosting the Most Rev. Michael Bruce Curry, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. In 2018, Presiding Bishop Curry visited the Diocese of Massachusetts. Our bishops in Massachusetts thought that GCB's commitment to youth empowerment, immigrant support, and ecumenical partnership made it the perfect choice for his Sunday morning visitation site. In 2019, Presiding Bishop Curry led us in an ecumenical service with FELC. Presiding Bishop Curry delivered a sermon about the need for peace through the love of God, especially in light of religious bigotry that has culminated in shootings at places of worship.

In May 2018, we celebrated a milestone: GCB became an official Mission of the Diocese, with greater autonomy and responsibility in running and paying for our operations. In November 2018, at the Diocesan Convention, the Diocese of Massachusetts admitted GCB as a mission. The Diocese invited our members, the Brigade Youth Program, and the Abigails Program to the convention, and they sang "Oh When the Saints" in celebration. Rev. Moses expressed our gratitude and reaffirmed our devotion to growing our ministries

We continue to benefit from generous grant funding as part of the Diocese's support for Mission Initiatives. The Diocese's commitment to Brockton and our work signifies that many people, including ones we have never met, value what we do and believe in who we are.

Of course, it is our relationships with the youth, women, and men of GCB that remain the most important. These ministries are the ones that Rev. Moses has held in his heart from the beginning, the initial spark that eventually lit GCB. Our ministries seek to meet people where they are and walk alongside them as they grow into their true identity in God. Each year brings a larger and more committed group of volunteers and leaders for the work of the Brigade. The Abigails program continually offers fellowship and support to girls and women of all ages. The Men of Grace, the most recent addition to our ministries, helps men find encouragement and community.

As we reflect on our rich history of relationship and reinvention, we look to the future with hope. God has a plan – and we know He is not finished with GCB or Brockton yet!



The Rt. Rev. Roy "Bud" F. Cederholm Jr.

The Rt. Rev. Roy F. Cederholm Jr., known as Bud, was born in Brockton, MA, in 1944. He is a Boston University graduate and went to seminary at Bexley Hall Divinity School in Rochester, NY. Bishop Cederholm was ordained to the priesthood in the Diocese of Massachusetts in 1972.

He served as rector of Christ Church Needham from 1989 until 2000, when he was elected as Bishop Suffragan in the Diocese of Massachusetts. Alongside the Rt. Rev. M. Thomas Shaw, SSJE and the Rt. Rev. Gayle Harris, Bishop Cederholm provided oversight for diocesan congregational development. This included clergy and congregation transition ministry, congregational business consultants, leadership development, collaborative ministries, and ministry to clergy families. His leadership and participation in the Diocese's summer Family Camp made it one of the Diocese's most popular events.

A gifted teacher and preacher, Bishop Cederholm is an active voice and witness for environmental stewardship. Sometimes known as the "Green Bishop," he works passionately to engage God's people in advocacy devoted to reversing climate change. Bishop Cederholm and his wife, Ruth Ann, have two sons and five awesome grandchildren.





The Rev. Dr. Moses Sowale

The Rev. Dr. Moses Sowale is a Grace-filled son, husband, father, counselor, and active voice for women's empowerment and youth development. He was raised in Nigeria by a single mother after he lost his father at an early age. He grew up in Immanuel College of Theology Ibadan, Oyo State, where his eldest brother, Bishop Samuel Sowale (then the Rev. Dr. Sowale) lectured.

He attended Immanuel's elementary and high schools before studying Electrical Engineering at Kwara State Polytechnic. However, God called him to ministry – and Moses returned to his childhood home, Immanuel College of Theology, for his seminarian studies. He was ordained into the priesthood in July 2003.

In Nigeria, Moses served in Ibadan at Bishop Akinyele Memorial Anglican Church and St. Paul's Anglican Church Yemetu as curate and youth chaplain respectively. Pursuing his passion for empowering women and youth through pastoral care, Moses founded The Voice Inc. Christian Center for Family Development, Pastoral Care, and Counseling. While engaged in these ministries, Moses completed his Bachelor's degree in Religious Studies at the Unversity of Ibadan in 2006.

Moses' gift for pastoral care led him to seek further education in the United States. At Boston College (BC) in Massachusetts, Moses earned a Master's degree in Pastoral Ministry (Care and Counseling) in 2009. While studying at BC, Moses served as an associate priest and Sunday school teacher at All Saints Parish Brookline. After earning his Master's, Moses worked as a counselor at Advocates Inc and continued pursuing his pastoral education.



The Rev. Dr. Moses Sowale

In 2010, Moses served as Missioner for Outreach at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Brockton, and went on to launch a new congregation called Grace Chapel Brockton. He has served at GCB as Missioner and Vicar ever since.

Moses earned his Doctor of Ministry from the Episcopal Divinity School (EDS) in Cambridge. At EDS, he received the Jonathan M. Daniels Fellowship Award, recognizing his work in Brockton and The Voice Inc.. The South Shore Leadership Conference awarded Moses with the Outstanding Faith, Justice, and Leadership Award in 2016 at the South Shore Regional Community Excellence Awards.


Rev. Moses is a pioneer of the Theology of Uniqueness. He created the IESSP (Identity, Educational, Spiritual and Social Plan) Curriculum that asserts we can both achieve equality and celebrate our uniqueness. He strives to be a bridge between people and groups with differing views. His greatest goal is to tell his story in all its glories and imperfections so he can empower others to embrace their own stories as sacred.

Moses enjoys playing lawn tennis, online soccer, and networking. Moses is married to Comfort, and they are blessed with two boys.









The Rev. Dr. David A. Killian

The Rev. Dr. David A. Killian was born in 1940. Rev. Killian served as rector of All Saints Parish for 20 years, making him that parish's second-longest serving rector. Committed to interfaith dialogue, Rev. Killian made All Saints Parish Brookline a place that supported people of all faiths on their spiritual journeys.


During Rev. Killian's tenure, the parish's attendance grew and increased its educational activities and outreach. He founded the Ruah Interfaith Spirituality Institute in 1992, drawing on his prior experience as the executive director of the Interfaith Counseling Center. This program assembled outstanding speakers from Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist, and Hindu traditions to share their spiritual heritages.

Rev. Moses' first connection to the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts was through the Rev. Dr. David A. Killian of All Saints Parish Brookline. All Saints graciously covered part of Rev. Moses' school expenses before he got his immigration papers, enabling him to continue his studies. It was Rev. Killian who introduced Rev. Moses to Bishop Bud Cederholm, who connected him to St. Paul's leadership in Brockton. Rev. Killian continued supporting Rev.

Moses and sent representatives from All Saints Parish Brookline to the first Sunday service at GCB.

In addition to rector of All Saints, Rev. Killian served on the boards of many organizations. He was president of the interfaith Brookline Clergy Association, a board member of the Massachusetts Episcopal Clergy Association, and a member of the Diocese's Standing Committee and Diocesan Council. He also edited the clergy newsletter of the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts.

Prior to becoming an Episcopal priest, Rev. Killian was a 25-year member of the Paulist Fathers, a religious order of priests in the Roman Catholic Church. Rev. Killian retired from his service as rector of All Saints Parish in 2012.



The Late Rev. James Mwangi Kangethe

The Rev. James Mwangi Kangethe, known as Fr. James, was born in Kenya in 1926. He graduated from Makerere University in Uganda with a certificate in Veterinary Science. After accepting the Lord in 1950, he received the call to ministry in 1962. He was ordained in 1971 in the Diocese of Nakuru by Bishop Langford Smith. Fr. James ministered in many roles: as air force chaplain, Christian rural worker, and a director of theological education.

Fr. James lost his first wife, Tabitha, in 1986. He went on to marry Victoria, a Christian evangelist and supportive wife and mother, in 1992. In 1999, he relocated to the U.S. to join Victoria, who worshipped at All Saints Cathedral in Worcester, MA.

In November 2003, Fr. James was licensed to officiate in the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts and went on to preach in several churches. In 2006, Fr. James and his family moved to Brockton and served at St. Paul's Episcopal Church with the Rev. Jackie Schmitt.

Fr. James served as a voluntary Associate Priest with Rev. Moses at GCB Episcopal-Anglican Church in Brockton, Massachusetts. Fr. James was a conservative in faith and a liberal in action, in perfect alignment with GCB's mission to break down barriers between people with differing views.

A gifted teacher, preacher, counselor, and theologian, Fr. James was fluent in Swahili, Kalenjin, Luhya and English. He was also an athlete and enjoyed playing soccer. Fr. James passed away at the age of 90 in 2016, blessed with seven wonderful children.





Amos and Agnes Adepoju

Amos Adepoju was born in Igbo-Elerin, Osun State in 1940, to Daniel Ishola and Maria Foyake Adepoju. He was originally baptized in the Methodist Church, but went on to join the Anglican Church. Though born a Muslim, Agnes went on to become a devout Christian and prayer warrior.

The Adepojus married in 1976, living and working in Ibadan. Amos became involved in the local Anglican Church in the 1980s, serving as a Pastor's Warden for several years at Bishop Oyebode Memorial Anglican Church.

His passion for evangelism led him to study theology and earn a certificate from Immanuel College of Theology in 1995. Through his beloved late nephew, Pastor Matthew Akinade, he won a visa lottery and the Adepojus relocated to the United States in 1996.

As parents, the Adepojus provided consistent love and care for their children despite economic hardships. The couple taught their children from a young age the meaning of hard work and a purposeful life. They built a respectable home on unshakable love for one another and for God. These values shaped Amos and Agnes' children, who grew into successful, thriving adults.

The Adepojus played a vital role in the founding of GCB, offering all their support, love, and energy. Amos is currently a patron of the Brigade Youth Program. Amos and Agnes' children have also been supportive of GCB.





Isaac & Olusola "Sola" Alabi

Isaac Olukayode and Olusola Alabi were both born into traditional Muslim and Anglican families. Isaac grew up in Ikere Ekiti, Ekiti State, Nigeria and Olusola grew up in Ibadan, Oyo State, Nigeria.

Isaac and Sola married in 1979. They traveled to Italy where Isaac studied mechanical engineering at the Institute of Technology, Citta di Castello, Italy from 1980 to 1982. He then worked at Leventis Motors Lagos when they returned to Nigeria. The Alabis both worked at Oyo State Teaching Service Commission Ibadan until 2003.

Isaac's first church was St. John's Anglican Church in Ikere Ekiti, where he was a member of the band and church choir. He was baptized by immersion by the Rev. Atibioke. Meeting the Challenge

Grace Chapel Brockton has overcome many obstacles with community strength, Diocesan support, and God's grace, and will continue to do so. Like all other parishes, we meet challenges as we map out our future.

Fostering Connection in a Busy, Distracted World

Sunday worship attendance has visibly increased in the past year. Presently, GCB has 50 worshipping members and 250 members associated with one of our ministries. However, fostering connection in a busy, distracted world can be challenging.

GCB is a church of working people – and particularly working single mothers. Many individuals in our congregation have demanding work schedules that often require them to work weekends to provide for their families. This can make it difficult for them to attend Sunday services.

Family extracurriculars can also affect members' ability to join us on Sunday. In many households, if they are able, children play sports or dance – activities that can consume the family's schedules. More and more competitions and tournaments take place on Sundays.

This is to say nothing of the distractions found in most everyone's pocket: at any given moment, we are susceptible to distraction by social media, games, or streaming services on our phones.

We remain optimistic amid these challenges. Most people cannot control their work schedules – but we can find creative ways to make church more accessible to them. All parents want their children to pursue their passions and develop skills, and through the Brigade there are many opportunities for kids to do just that. We also know technology can be a bridge of connection instead of a wall of distraction. We are committed as a church to finding ways to meet our community where they are, as they are.

FUNDING OUR VISION

GCB has a committed core of lifelong church members with strong weekly giving habits. Unlike many established churches, however, a great deal of our members face significant financial hardships.

2019 was a year of opportunity and challenge. It was GCB's first year as an official Mission of the Diocese of Massachusetts. Our primary funding from the Diocese (a \$104,000 Mission Initiatives Grant) was \$40,000 less than in 2018.

While there are many potential funding sources for our special programs, there are virtually none for regular church operating expenses. In 2019, our Finance Committee and Executive Committee worked to maximize grant applications and identify ways for special programs to cover appropriate shares of our rent and staff salaries.

This strategy helped to alleviate, but not prevent, reductions in staff hours and salaries. Most notably for 2020, GCB was no longer able to meet the Diocese's salary and benefit guidelines for a full-time Vicar. Consequently, Rev. Moses has been employed by GCB at 70% time.

Despite this, we can see growth in frequency, consistency, and amount of weekly offerings in several of our members. By the grace of God, GCB has continued its work with gifts, grants, staff hour reductions, and staff downsizing. We remain hopeful that continued growth in our congregation and increased funding for programs will help us meet our financial challenges.



FINDING A BUILDING WE CAN GROW IN

GCB rents its physical space with the First Evangelical Lutheran Church. We have access to a small chapel space with a capacity for 70 people and an office space for the Vicar and administration.

While we use the space to the best of our ability, our primary challenge is lack of sufficient space. We have one conference room and three small classrooms to host all ministry programs. Particularly when it comes to the Brigade, there is no appropriate space for sports, music lessons, or to hold events. The Brigade's After-School program relies on volunteers, and we do not have adequate space for staff to provide supervision and mentoring.

As we write this, we worship and do our program activities online in light of Covid-19. This brings the unexpected blessing of new members being able to join from around the world. When in-person services resume, acquiring a building that allows for multiple ministries to meet simultaneously would be ideal. Our vision is to secure a physical home with room for GCB to worship, learn, play, and grow.

OUR 10-RESOLUTION PLAN

We are forging a bold path forward for Grace Chapel Brockton. We believe we can meet the challenges we face, and meet our community's need for a place to grow together in fellowship.

At the February 2021 Annual Parish Meeting, we passed a 10-Resolution Plan to sustain and expand GCB's life-giving work. Our 10-Resolution Plan is as follows.

Lay Leaders Retreat & Empowerment

We will assemble at least 12 lay leaders and as many members as possible to participate in a weekend-long retreat. The retreat's purpose is to strategically organize for GCB's success through prayer, reflection, gratitude, and bonding. During the retreat we will equip lay leaders to guide GCB with ownership, commitment, and accountability.

The retreat will involve prayer and worship, lectures, discussions, and organizational roadmapping. We hope to hold our retreat in-person if we determine it is safe for our community to gather.

Online Presence and Engagement

We will build an engaging website and social media presence to communicate GCB's value and vision. Collaborating with a web designer, we will support new members with an aesthetically pleasing, user-friendly website. A strong, consistent social media presence will help current members share with their friends what GCB has to offer, drawing in new members.

Parish Profile

We resolved to write a parish profile that communicates the unique value GCB adds to the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts. You are reading that document right now. Our parish profile will help us nurture in our congregation a sense of shared identity, and show people how we celebrate the beauty and blessing of our uniqueness in Christ.



We will establish a real, formal relationship between GCB, the Diocese of Massachusetts, and the Church of Nigeria. We hope to lay the foundation for a rich friendship between our churches that will yield positive results for Christians around the globe.

As our members are able to visit their homes in Nigeria, they will return to their churches there and share about how GCB is breaking down walls created by our differences. Between these visits and the letter our congregation wrote to Archbishop Segun Okubadejo of Ibadan Province, we will begin bridging the divide in the Anglican Communion.

INTENTIONAL TEACHINGS SERIES ABOUT THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH - EPISCOPAL 101

We will explore a series of intentional teachings about the Episcopal and Anglican Churches called Episcopal 101. The series will provide a forum for members to discuss and deepen their understanding of theology, liturgy, the holy sacraments, and confirmation. This will allow people to make an informed decision about membership.

ANNUAL WELCOMING SERVICE

We will honor new GCB members with a formal welcoming service and reception once a year. We are developing a welcoming team that will help people officially become members, answer new members' questions, and direct them to GCB programs that will enrich their spiritual lives.

REIMAGINING OUR FINANCES & FUNDRAISING

We will increase our total internal revenue to at least \$50,000 annually, and think beyond offerings to fund our ministries. Through The Voice Inc., a faith-based nonprofit founded by Rev. Moses, we will explore funding opportunities outside the Episcopal Church, while GCB will continue to explore resources within it.

To achieve this goal, we seek to hire a financial manager and grant writer. Our financial manager will help us locate grant funding and individual donors passionate about our mission. We also plan to hold fundraisers for the Brigade, the Abigails Program, and at the Annual Harvest & Anniversary Thanksgiving service. With greater financial freedom, our leadership will be able to

MUTUAL MINISTRY REVIEW

We will implement regular mutual ministry reviews for our leaders, employees, and volunteers. Reviews will affirm our employees' and volunteers' strengths and gifts, illuminate areas for growth, and celebrate their accomplishments. This will help GCB support its lay leadership and ordained ministers.





A NEW BUILDING

We will secure a building in Brockton that provides the space we need to worship, learn, and celebrate together. We will find a building that accommodates sports activities for the Brigade and larger ministry events as needed. Having a physical church home for GCB will also create a stronger sense of communal identity.

PARTNERSHIP WITH THE VOICE INC

We will enhance the partnership between GCB and The Voice Inc. to continue expanding, supporting, and diversifying GCB's work. The Voice Inc. and its principles are the bedrock of GCB's ministries and outreach. Our goal is for GCB to clarify the bound and boundaries of its partnership with The Voice Inc., enabling the church to take ownership of The Voice Inc.'s values and principles independently.
